Two meetings were planned but did not take place due to scheduling conflicts: one on the new GCSE reforms and one on the work of Embassies and Cultural Institutes.

2. APPG activity

- In March, Baroness Coussins met officials at the Ministry of Justice on behalf of the APPG for an update on the MOJ's progress in developing a new Qualifications Framework for interpreters and translators deployed in the criminal justice system.
- In March, the APPG submitted responses to the **Labour Party's National Policy Forum** consultations.
- In March, the APPG submitted evidence to the **DCMS Committee Inquiry on Minority Languages.**
- In March, on behalf of the APPG, Baroness Coussins gave out the first National Police Language Services Awards at the National Police Language Services Conference at Leicestershire Police HQ.

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- In August, the APPG submitted evidence to the Covid-19 Inquiry relating to languages and communication in the fields of health, education, justice, and international relations, with relevance to Modules 1, 3 and 5 of the Inquiry (Module: Resilience and preparedness; Module 3: Impact of Covid-19 on healthcare systems; and Module 5: Government procurement).
- In September, the Secretariat attended the **EU Delegation** event on languages education in the UK.
- In October, the Secretariat attended the ILCS 'Building collaborations between academics and policymakers' policy workshop.
- In November, Baroness Garden and Wera Hobhouse MP attended the **German Ambassador's Special Forum** on 'Making the Case for German'.
- In November, the APPG issued a public statement of concern about planned closures of degrees in languages and cultures at the University of Aberdeen, and wrote to the University leadership and the relevant Ministers in the Scottish Government.
- In November, the APPG supported the Times Education Commission in publishing a series of articles in the Times calling for better MFL provision, followed by media coverage on BBC Radio 4 (see Appendix).
- In November, Baroness Coussins, Nia Griffith MP and Baroness Garden attended the launch of **the Languages Gateway** at the British Academy.

3. Activity of the Officers of the APPG (relevant to the APPG's work):

Spoken contributions:

- In March, Baroness Coussins tabled a <u>debate</u> on whether the right for people engaged with the criminal justice system to access translation and interpreting services will be affected by the Retained EU Law (Revocation and Reform) Bill.
- In March, Baroness Garden spoke in a <u>debate</u> about challenges of the new **Turing scheme** compared to Erasmus Plus.
- In June, Baroness Coussins spoke in a <u>debate</u> about **school trips to the UK**.
- In June, Tonia Antoniazzi MP spoke in a <u>debate</u> about the **Council of Europe**, about her role as a member of the CoE delegation and her experience as a languages graduate.
- In October, Baroness Coussins tabled a <u>debate</u> on the **relocation to the UK of Afghans who previously worked as interpreters for the British Army** and Afghan former employees of the British Council. She revisited the question during debates in <u>November</u> and on <u>December 5th</u> and <u>12th</u>.
- In October, Baroness Coussins spoke in a <u>debate</u> on the long-term strategic challenges posed by China, in support of the **Mandarin Excellence Programme**.
- In November, Baroness Coussins spoke in a <u>debate</u> on the report from the COVID-19 Committee *Living in a COVID World: A Long-term Approach to Resilience and Wellbeing*, with reference to evidence included in the **APPG's submission to the Covid-19 Inquiry.**
- On 18 December, Baroness Coussins spoke in the <u>second reading</u> of the Victims and Prisoners Bill in relation to interpretation and translation services.
- On 15 January 2024, Baroness Coussins spoke in a <u>debate</u> on the BBC Royal Charter.

Written Questions:

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- During 2023, Baroness Coussins tabled 19 Written Questions covering Afghan interpreters, languages in education, translation/interpreting in justice and health, and new salary threshold rules for language assistants and university lecteurs.
- During 2023, Tonia Antoniazzi MP tabled two Written Questions on **international** educational visits.

Other:

- In November, Baroness Coussins contributed comments to BBC Radio 4' File on 4
 programme on failings in the provision of public service interpreters in the courts,
 hospitals, social services and other public services. (See Appendix).
- In December, the House of Lords Education for 11–16 Year Olds Committee published its report Requires improvement: urgent change for 11–16 education which called for better provision of languages education in secondary. Three members of the APPG on Modern Languages are on this Committee (Lord Aberdare, Baroness Blower and Baroness Garden).
